On July 31, 2018, the Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act was signed into law, commonly referred to as Perkins V. This legislation is dedicated to increasing learner access to high-quality Career Technical Education (CTE) programs of study. With a focus on systems alignment and program improvement, Perkins V is critical to ensuring that programs are prepared to meet the ever-changing needs of learners and employers. Perkins V funds must be used to develop, coordinate, implement, and improve CTE state-approved programs to meet the needs identified in the region's Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA). Examples include:

- Career Exploration and Development
- Professional Development (Instructional and noninstructional personnel)
- Occupational Skills and Academic Skills
- Program Implementation and Improvement
- Program Evaluation
